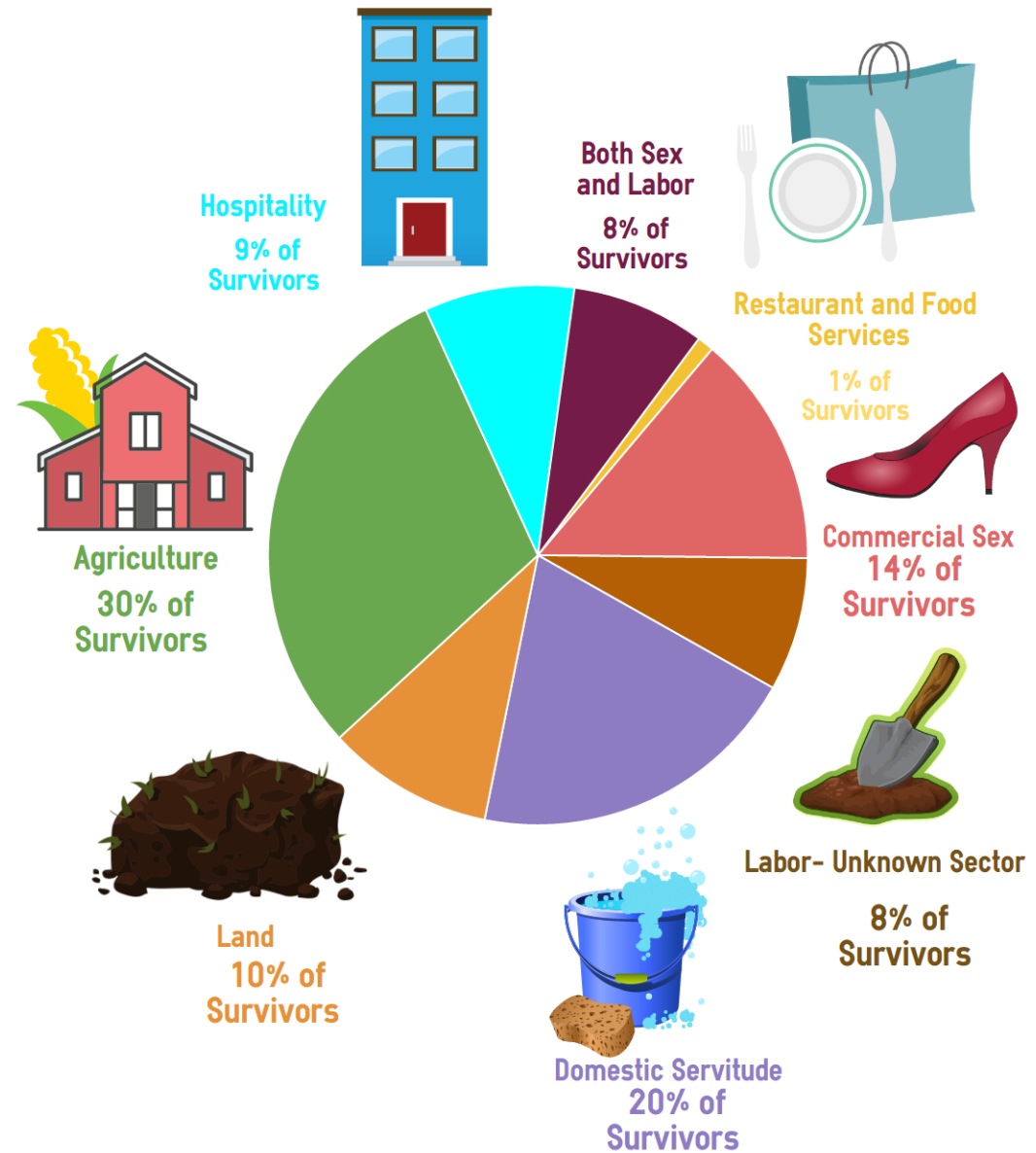

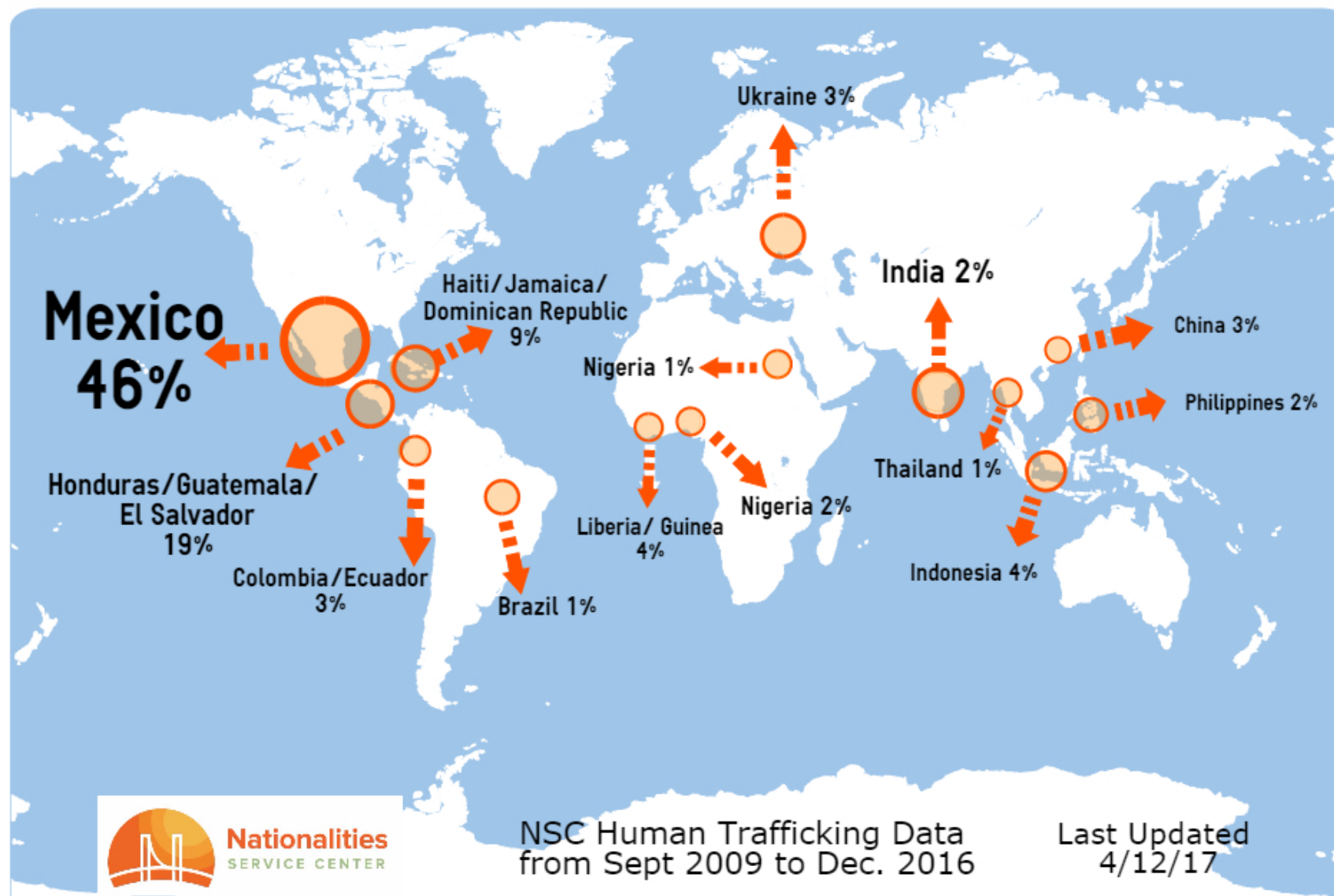

Warning Signs



- Inconsistent stories/scripted stories
- Accompanying party insists on answering questions for patient and refuses to leave
- Lack of knowledge of whereabouts
- Evidence of delayed medical care
- Evidence of physical or sexual abuses
- Appears fearful, anxious, depressed, submissive, or paranoid, especially when mention law enforcement
- Not in control of personal possessions
- Not free to leave or come and go
- Works excessively long/weird hours
- Unpaid, paid very little, or paid only through tips
- Is required to live in housing provided by employer
- Sleeps and works in the same place
- Tattoos / Branding

Myth

Human trafficking is a global problem, but it doesn't happen in U.S.

Fact

- Human trafficking exists in every countries, including United States! It could happen everywhere, in cities, suburbs, and rural areas.

Myth

Human trafficking is the same as smuggling.

Fact

- Smuggling is a crime against national border, while Human trafficking is crime for human right.

Myth

Only women and girls can be victims and survivors of trafficking.

Fact

Anyone could be victims, especially those who are:

- Lack of economic opportunities
- Lack of social/family support
- Lack of immigration status
- Homelessness
- Youth in foster care system
- LGBTQ
- History of sexual abuse

Human Trafficking is such a huge social issue, and there is nothing I can do to help.
